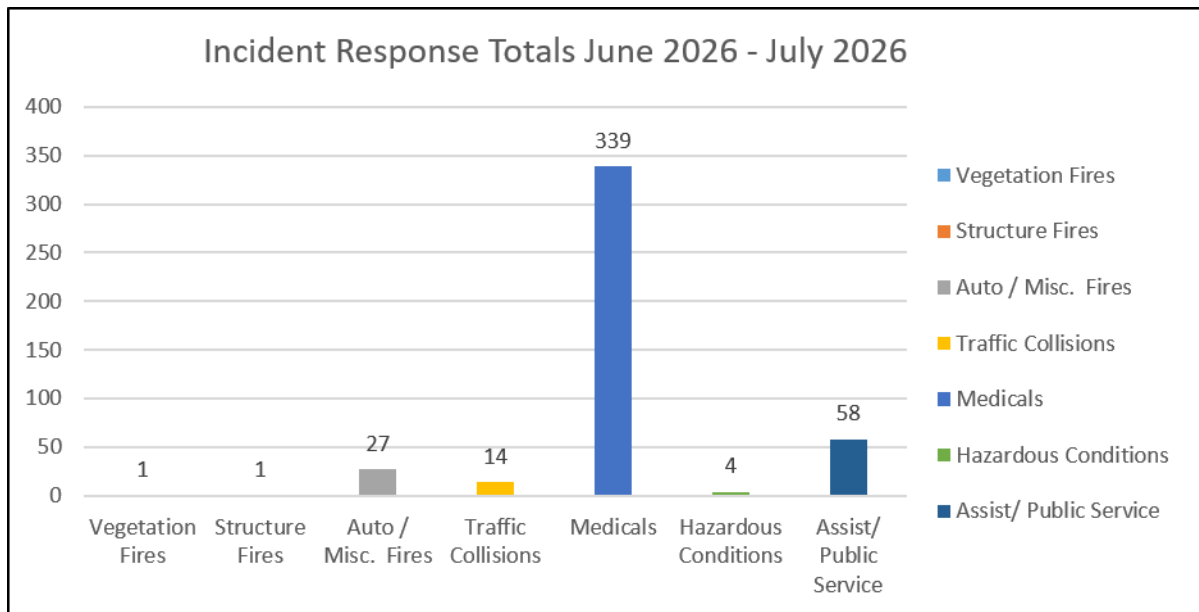

Incident Activity

On July 1, Engines 88 and 89, with assistance from El Dorado Hills Fire Department and CAL FIRE, responded to a UPS box truck fire on eastbound Highway 50 just west of Cambridge Road. Upon arrival, crews found a working engine compartment fire that had extended into the adjacent vegetation. Firefighters quickly extinguished the vehicle fire, contained the vegetation fire to approximately 0.3 acres, and successfully salvaged the majority of the packages being transported. There were no reported injuries.

On July 7, Battalion 2711, Engine 88, Engine 28, and Medic 86 responded to a vehicle vs pedestrian on Cameron Park drive near Oxford dr. Units arrived to find an adult male who had sustained critical multisystem traumatic injuries after being struck by a vehicle. Firefighter/paramedics immediately initiated advanced life support interventions. Following the arrival of the transporting ambulance, patient care was transferred, and an Engine 88 firefighter/paramedic accompanied the patient to UC Davis Medical Center to provide continued advanced care during transport. This incident highlights the critical role our firefighter/paramedics play in delivering advanced prehospital emergency medical care during life-threatening emergencies.

On July 12, E88 responded to a vegetation fire near 2635 Cambridge Road in Cameron Park. Upon arrival, crews located a vegetation fire on a vacant lot. The fire burned approximately 0.04 acres of grass and was contained by E88, E283, and E2771. CAL FIRE Law Enforcement Officers responded to conduct an investigation. Following the investigation, one individual was taken into custody on suspicion of arson.

Community Events

The department also successfully completed the annual permitting, inspection, and oversight of the Cameron Park Summer Spectacular fireworks display. Fire Prevention personnel worked closely with CSD event staff and the licensed pyrotechnic operator throughout the planning process to ensure compliance with all applicable fire and life safety requirements. This year's display included the addition of 5-inch mortar shells, which enhanced the overall show while remaining within approved safety parameters. The event was conducted safely and without issue. There were no violations, reportable incidents, or fire-related emergencies associated with the fireworks display.

Department Updates

The department is approaching the finish line for the new Type III engine, E389. During June, CAL FIRE Fleet Managers and mechanics completed the delivery inspection and identified several warranty items requiring correction. As a result, E389 was returned to the dealership to complete the necessary repairs. The crew at Station 89 have been diligently organizing, inventorying, and procuring equipment, hose, and specialized gear that will be assigned to the engine. The department anticipates placing E389 into service by the end of this week.

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Receive and File

Unimproved Lots (Vacant Lots) – The Request for Proposal (RFP) was reviewed, and contractors were selected and assigned to parcels to complete the abatement work. Progress is being made and contractors are submitting photos upon completion. A total of sixteen (16) lots are being moved forward with abatement work.

CSD Parcels – Coordination is underway with maintenance to complete wildfire mitigation practices on properties.

Vegetation/Fire Hazard Complaints – Complaints coming in are being followed up on by the appropriate department. Two properties being abated have had the most complaints/concerns, so having that work done will be on them will be greatly beneficial.

Greater Cameron Park Fire Safe Council – Met with the Fire Safe Council for the first time since the Ready for Wildfire event back in March. Some new ideas were brought up during the meeting and progress is going to be made on spreading/displaying more information about county resources for chipping, defensible space, hazard tree removal, free assessments by the Fire Safe Council, and Firewise Communities: the benefits and how to start one.

Maps – Working on updating maps for the CSD, providing some new detailed styled maps for each park to eventually have posted on the website for the public to view.

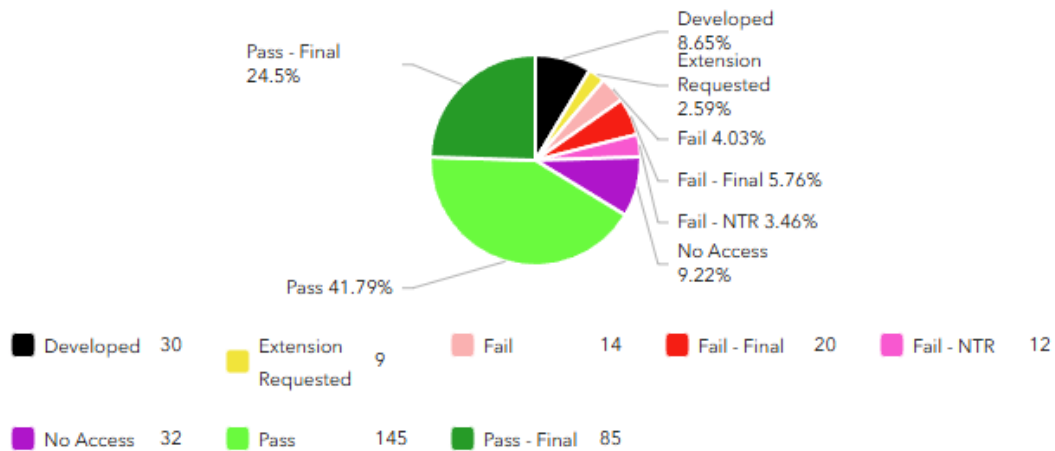

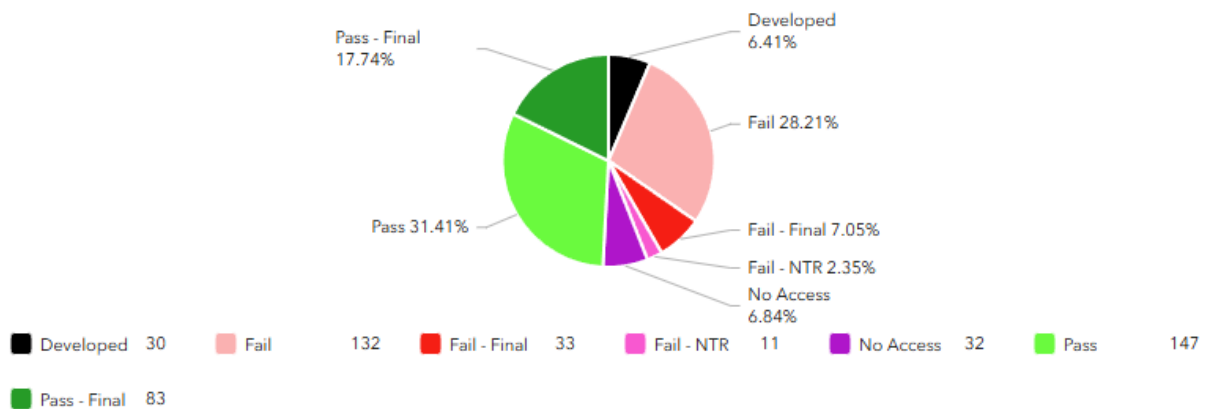
